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#### DESCRIPTION

This is a survey course of development of Russian culture. Students will analyze Russian films (with English subtitles) which reflect certain historical/cultural periods and major trends and patterns of Russian culture. Special emphasis will be given to understanding the political perspectives through which every film presents diverse and often unique Russian cultural phenomenon.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

The goal of the course is to introduce students with major facets of Russian culture including literature, music, architecture, cinema, paintings, ballet, ets.

Students will acquire understanding of particularities of Russian culture and will receive information about diverse interpretive practices of Russian cultural phenomena.

This course will help students to develop the skills necessary to interpret films: cinematic styles, Film technique, ideological functions, relations between film production and political regimes.

#### **OUTCOMES**

At the end of the course students will be able to describe the essential features of Russian culture which were manifested through religious and social movements, national traditions, architecture, literature, music and other cultural products. They will be able to understand the links between politics and social values of historical periods on the one hand and cinematic productions which interpret them on the other hand.

#### **COURSE NOTES**

This is a lecture/seminar course and you are expected to participate actively in discussions and group work during the class time.

During the course you will have few *pop-up quizzes* on the required reading, film or lecture materials. Missed quizzes cannot be repeated.

You are expected to write the *two assignments* 4-5 pages each, double-spaced, with bibliography (MLA, APA or Chicago style). Submission can be done as a hard copy (preferable), or electronically. Late papers will be penalized at 5% per day. The topics for the assignments will be given 10 days prior to the due date. The additional instructions will be given on D2L.

Instructions for midterm and final examinations will be given on D2L.

Absences are excused for the usual reasons: illness, religious observance, UVM sports or debate participation. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to obtain the missing lecture: you can from the notes of your fellow students or come to see the instructor during office hour. If you are in distress or have extenuating personal reasons for protracted absences, you should let the instructor know as fast as possible.

#### **ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT**

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:



- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
