Critical analysis of Hispanic Cinemas: Transnational Latin American Cinemas

DESCRIPTION

We will explore the meanings of 'Transnational,' as it refers to or differs from global, glocal, national, pan-American and other terms. The analysis of representative films from the 1990s-2000s will provide a springboard into film theories and current debates about the place of Latin American cinemas in the national and international film scenes. Departing from limiting literary and word-based studies of cinema, the course will pay attention to culture, power, and industry aspects to situate Latin American cinemas in a globalized economic and political order. All films are subtitled. This course also relies on the reading and examination of academic texts, both in English and Spanish.

OBJECTIVES

Estudiar conceptos teóricos tales como transnacional, nacional, global, neoliberalismo, panamericano, representación, ideología y cultura en su aplicación al análisis cinematográfico.

Aprender los términos técnicos esenciales para el análisis de los filmes.

Ganar una apreciación del cine como industria cultural y objeto artístico conectado con las estructuras sociales.

Explorar la posición del cine de Latinoamérica en la industria global.

Formarse en el análisis de secuencia y de los filmes desde la óptica de los Estudios de cine.

OUTCOMES

Al final del curso podrás describir, analizar y evaluar la conexión entre conceptos teóricos y el contenido y la estructura formal de importantes filmes de Latinoamérica. También podrás entender los contextos nacionales, regionales y transnacionales de la industria cinematográfica de Latinoamérica. Asímismo, obtendrás las herramientas para presentar correctamente los filmes y escribir ensayos académicos.

COURSE NOTES

Films are to be watched during the labs/tutorials. While viewing, you are expected to take written **notes** and get ready to ask/answer questions about the content and techniques used. Some films may contain strong language and sex scenes.

Twice-weekly lectures will explore the topics for the week and will amplify and extend the issues raised in the reading material. Lectures will always include analysis and discussion of film clips and film stills. They are a key component of the course. Lecture notes and film clips will not be posted online or given out to students. Be sure to attend all lectures!

Readings for this course may be in English. You are expected to take notes, read all texts at home before each class, underline important information and get ready to answer/ask in class questions about the content and topics or concepts used. You must use your dictionaries to understand the readings and be able to express ideas in Spanish.

The final paper must study a film from Latin America (if you do not know the origin of a film, go to www.imdb.com or ask the professor).

10% of the grade will be deducted for each day any written assignment is late if there is no appropriate documentation to justify the absence or the failure to complete it. After 5 days, assignments will not be accepted.

Failure to attend class on the day of an exam will result in an F unless the student has legitimate reasons. The instructor may request a Physician/ Counselor statement form to confirm an absence for health reasons. A student who is absent from a test for legitimate reasons must discuss immediately an alternative course of action with the professor.

The Department's drop-box, located in the foyer area of the third floor in Craigie Hall between blocks D and C, is available for depositing assignments and course work. The material placed in the drop-box will be collected and date-stamped at the beginning and at the end of the working day. Make sure to observe due dates.

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.



While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
