DESCRIPTION

This course will examine themes and concepts shaping the discussion about the 'experimental' in cinemas of Latin America. Since this historiography is long and varied, we will concentrate on more recent film samples and will link technical and production characteristics to discussions about burning concerns in Latin American societies.

Objectives

By the end of the course, students should:

- ✓ Have a good grasp of central questions, concepts and debates relevant to a discussion of the 'experimental'.
- ✓ Be able to think critically about film as an art and a technology
- ✓ Feel comfortable presenting results to an audience of peers
- ✓ Be familiar with film technique and critical research tools for essay, and other types of writing
- ✓ Be conversant with a historiography which is still in the making.

COURSE WORK AND GRADING

Participation 10 %

Full marks will be given to students who demonstrate through their participation in class discussions an engagement with the course readings and screenings. Weekly preparation includes careful reading and analysis of film and texts as well as drawing relations between them with respect to themes, techniques, and objectives.

Critical viewing and oral analysis (Feb. 4-11)

Individual students will analyze and present a clip from one of the films studied. The exercise will consist in describing and discussing/presenting the role played by the 'experimental' through costume or lighting or props, etc., in a sequence. The student will also study the significance of the sequence for the whole film.

Film review (Due in class Feb 18)

To write a one page review (250 words) of one of the films of the course or of another Latin American movie or documentary that engages with the 'experimental'.

Essay Proposal (Due in class March 10)

10%

Students will write a brief summary of the primary source (150 words) and a description of the final essay topic (300 words) that will shape the final essay, including 2-3 arguments relevant to the 'experimental' and to themes of the course. (450 words total)

Scholarly annotated bibliography (Due in class March 17)

10%

The annotated bibliography will list the primary source and will reference three to five academic articles in the field of film studies to support the final essay topic. Students are to provide a brief (2-3 sentence paragraph) explanation of the relevance of each article.

Group discussion (March 24)

15%

Students will work in groups to produce a 20-25-minute panel discussion on two readings as they apply to a chosen film. Each member of the group will contribute to the research behind this project by searching and providing meaningful additional information about the theme, film or the historical context, asking engaging questions, and choosing relevant film sequences and techniques to illustrate points and arguments. As the panel is expected to develop into engaging group discussions, students are encouraged to be creative. Readings will be assigned.

Writing exercise (An in-class assignment. March 31)

Students are to write a solid paragraph or two about one or more of the films studied. The activity will allow students to comment on concepts and issues of the course such as realism, 'experimental,' time image, memory, etc in their association with composition, colour, etc.

Research Essay (Due in class Apr. 7)

25%

This research essay will examine a particular film (or films) in relation to a specific concept(s) or issue(s) from the course readings/lectures and will comprise sequence analyses. Paper length: (MA 3000-3500 words; PhD 3700-4500 words) not including References section.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor

involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
