DESCRIPTION

A continuation of Italian 201, this course provides training in the comprehension, speaking, reading and writing of Italian. Emphasis will be on developing further the students' communicative competence as well as their knowledge of the Italian culture. Labs will be officially scheduled by the department.

Prerequisites

Italian 30, Italian 201 or equivalent. All university level prerequisites for Italian language courses must be met with a grade of at least "C-" or better.

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
