### DESCRIPTION

Study of different types of communication (print and electronic media, correspondence, business). Analysis of relevant aspects of Italian contemporary life.

During the course students will develop a language and cultural competence based on the analysis of several current issues in the Italian world as seen through various media sources such as newspapers, magazines, movies, and the web. To have a better understanding of Italian culture contemporary literary texts such as, excerpts from a narrative text, short stories, will also be studied. Great attention will be given to reading and writing skills and strategies

#### OBJECTIVES

Students should be able to understand the topic of discussion conducted slowly and clearly, in a standard spoken language, to guess the meaning of unknown words from the context, to follow the main points of extended discussion around them. Students should be able to interact with the teacher and the other students, answering and asking questions, to express their viewpoint in a clear way, using appropriate vocabulary. Students should be able to read and understand general and specific information, significant points in many kinds of texts on contemporary issues such as articles, reports, short stories etc.(skimming and scanning reading strategies), to identify the main conclusions in clearly written argumentative texts, to guess the meaning of unknown words from the context, to use a dictionary to confirm the meaning. Students should be able to summarize the content of a text, the plot of a short story, to write short essays on a topic and express personal opinions, giving reasons and explanations **PREREOUISITES**

#### **COURSE NOTES**

The course will be conducted in Italian.

Students have to take 3 written tests which will include reading comprehension, summaries and short compositions. The assignment will deal with a small research on some of the cultural topics.

The final oral presentation will be on a topic chosen by students among the ones covered in class. A list of possible topics will be posted on blackboard. This is a course requirement. No substitutions for another assignment or test will be allowed.

By class participation the instructor means students' participation in class activities and conversation, as well as

their capacity to get involved in small research assignments to be discussed in class. All assignments, tests and the oral presentation must be completed to pass this course.

# LATE ASSIGNMENTS AND MISSED TESTS POLICY :

Missed tests, assignments and examinations will be given a grade of F.

# ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
