CALENDAR COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to the scientific study of language, including the analysis of word, sentence, and sound structure, and the exploration of language as a human, biological, social, and historical phenomenon.

Course Hours:

3 units; H(3-0)

Prerequisite(s):

There is no prerequisite for this course.

DETAILED COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide students with the tools necessary to understand the basics of the scientific study of language from how to characterise individual speech sounds and their interactions to the building blocks of words and sentences, and how we interpret meaning from those units.

ABSENCE AND LATE WORK

All Assignments —including the reading response— are due at the beginning of class on the indicated date. Assignments may be submitted in pencil, but only assignments submitted in pen, or typed, can be remarked. No late assignments will be accepted without prior consent from the instructor. There will be no make-up exams. At the instructor's discretion, students who miss the midterm for a valid, documented reason may have the weighting normally assigned to a midterm exam transferred to the final exam. Valid excuses for test absence are birth, death, marriage, and serious illness or injury on the day of the test. Appropriate supporting documentation is required. Unexcused absence from an exam will result in a grade of zero. Students who miss the final exam will only be able to make up the exam in exceptional circumstances (see calendar).

ASSIGNMENTS: There are three assignments each worth 10% of the final grade due Wednesday, May 25 (Morphology), Monday, June 20 (Phonetics & Phonology), and Wednesday, June 29 (Syntax). Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date that they are due. Because of the length of the semester, assignments will be graded and handed back to the student the following class. Therefore, no late assignments will be accepted without prior consent of the instructor.

5-PARAGRAPH ESSAY: Before the end of the semester (June 29 at the latest), students will submit a 1-2page essay investigating a linguistic trait in their own dialect/language. This essay can be handed in at any point during the semester before June 29. Further instructions will be provided on an instruction sheet during the first class.

MIDTERM EXAM: The midterm exam is worth 20% of the final grade and will take place during the **first hour** of class on Thursday, June 8.

PARTICIPATION: The best way to learn linguistic methods is through practice. At the beginning of most (10) classes (except for the first and final classes, and the day of the midterm), students will be given a practice problem to work out on their own and hand in. Each of the ten practice problems are worth 1% of the final grade (total 10%). The answers to the practice problem will be provided and discussed after students hand in their answers, and therefore students must make every effort to arrive at class on time so they will be able to get these participation points.

FINAL EXAM: A registrar-scheduled final exam will take place during July 2-4 (inclusive). The exam is cumulative, but will be weighed towards topics covered after the midterm. A review will be held in-class on June 29 before the exam.

RESEARCH PARTICIPATION AND CRITICAL THINKING: LING 201 students may add an Experiential Learning/Critical Thinking component. This is an optional bonus component that can add up to 4% to your final grade. The educational objective of this component of the course is to provide you with an introduction to contemporary research in the field of linguistics. You can complete this component by either participating in ongoing research studies in the department (Option 1: Research Participation), by completing 1-page article evaluations from a designated list (Option 2: Article Evaluations), or by a combination of these two options.

Option 1: Research Participation. To participate in departmentally approved research studies, you must first login to <http://ucalgary-ling.sona-systems.com> to create a participant account. Studies will be posted to this website as they become available during the term, and you will be able to sign up for participation in any study through the website. You earn 1% (1 credit) for each study in which you participate. Each study will be followed by an educational debriefing experience. Please keep in mind that there may not be enough studies available, so you should seek studies early in the term and frequently check for open timeslots. **The last day to participate in studies and earn Extra Credit for Ling 201 is June 30, 2016.**

Option 2: Article Evaluations. You can also complete the Extra Credit component by reading and evaluating short research articles, from various subdisciplines in the field of linguistics. You earn 2% (2 credits) for each acceptable evaluation. The readings and the review form are available on D2L. This form asks you to list the article you have reviewed, the research area of the article, and a series of four critical thinking questions on the content of the article. Please note that you can submit only **one evaluation per due date (June 6 and June 30)** during the semester.

Option 3: Combinations of Options 1 and 2. You can complete the Extra Credit component by combining credit from Options 1 and 2 (i.e. 2% through Option 1 and 2% through Option 2). Since article evaluations can only be submitted at two points in the semester, students who choose to earn Extra Credit by combining Options 1 and 2 are strongly advised to submit an evaluation on the earlier due date.

PLAGIARISM AND ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course, when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

1. the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
2. parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
3. the whole work (e.g. an essay) is copied from another source; and/or
4. a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted. Students are often encouraged to work together in preparing homework assignments, but check with your instructor beforehand. However, unless noted otherwise in writing, students must write up their own answers for submission of the assignment. Failure to do so constitutes plagiarism.

Plagiarism is an extremely serious academic offence. Possible penalties for plagiarism include: failing the assignment, failing the course, disciplinary probation, suspension, or expulsion. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of plagiarism is also guilty of academic misconduct.
