DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction to the field of sociolinguistics and provides insight into how social factors, such as gender, socio-economic status, or age influence language.

OBJECTIVES

The course introduces students to variation in language and the factors that influence variation and change. Topics covered will include: language variation and change, style, language attitudes, multilingualism and language choice, politeness, socio-economic status, gender, and social networks.

OUTCOMES

Students will be familiarized with different types of variation and the social factors that affect language variation and change. They will be able to describe possible factors contributing to language variation.

Discussion Posts: Students will reply to a posted question **on the discussion forum on D2L by 11:59 pm the day they are due.** Questions will be posted on the Monday before the due date. Students will be assessed for their participation and for contributing **at least 100 words** in a comprehensible, relevant answer.



Quizzes: Quizzes will be **in person at the beginning of the class**. They will consist of true/false, multiple choice, and short answer questions (10 questions total). Material from the lectures and textbook content covered up to the date of the quiz will be included in the quiz. Quizzes cannot be made up at a later date. Two versions of the quiz will be distributed with the same content, but presented in a different order.

Assignment: Students will be asked to choose one sociolinguist and research their work and contributions to sociolinguistics. They will present their findings in a short paper (3-5 pages). The assignment **must be submitted on D2L by 11:59 pm on the day it is due**. More information will be provided in a separate document.

Final Project: Students will have the opportunity to engage in designing a research project by completing a proposal. Working alone or in groups of two, students will determine a research question which **must be submitted on D2L by 11:59 pm on the day it is due.** The last class will be made up of student presentations on their proposal. Students will provide a written proposal (7-10 pages) that **must be submitted on D2L by 11:59 on the day of the last class (June 15).** More information will be provided in a separate document.

Late submissions for the assignment and final project will incur a 10% deduction per day late, unless discussed in advance. Late discussion post submissions without discussing with the instructor in advance will not be accepted. Missed guizzes will result in a zero for that guiz.

GRADING SCALE

Course grades will be assigned on a distribution that is NOT more restrictive than the one below:

 To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A, but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Criteria for Letter Grades

- A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.
- A, A- range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.
- B range: Good Performance. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows
 evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form
 and/or content.
- C range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.
- D range: Marginally meets standards. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.
- F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
