**DESCRIPTION**

This course introduces samples of various genres of the Russian oral tradition such as epic songs, ballads, ceremonial chants, religious verses, folktales, limerick-like rhymes, narrative jokes, children's horror stories and urban legends (in Russian with juxtaposed English translations). It explores the peak achievements of Russian folklore studies, their contribution to Russian nation building, the permeable boundary between elite and popular culture, as well as the contexts of leisure and work, rites of passage and seasonal rituals in which traditional folklore functions, the impact of urbanization on Russian popular culture and the incorporation of Soviet ideology into it.

**Prerequisites:** Russian 303, or consent of the Department

**OBJECTIVES**

This course aims to acquaint students with the changing face of the Russian oral tradition which is an important component of Russian popular culture. Upon successful completion, students will be able to recognize and analyse different genres of the Russian oral tradition. The readings will acquaint students with the insights and views of authors belonging to different scholarly traditions. Exposure to a range of texts, video-clips, images, and soundtracks will improve students' mastery of the Russian language and culture.

**ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT**

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:  
a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);  
b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;  
c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or  
d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
