DESCRIPTION

A continuation of Spanish 201, this is a beginning level course primarily for students with prior knowledge of the language (one semester of university level Spanish or Spanish 30). This course is structured on the communicative approach to language learning and strong emphasis is placed on basic skills, namely: listening, speaking, reading, writing and cultural awareness.

Prerequisites

Spanish 30, Spanish 201 or equivalent.

OBJECTIVES

This course, measured as an integrated performance in speaking, listening, reading and writing is intended to familiarize you with the structure of the Spanish language, and expose you to different Hispanic cultures, increasing your awareness of the Spanish-speaking world.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of five basic skills:

Listening

You will be able to more completely understand the content of audio and video material that accompanies the textbook. Recognize and understand expressions from authentic media.

Speaking

Develop communicative abilities in order to function in simple survival situations, such as placing phone calls, ordering a meal, making travel arrangements, renting an apartment, explaining medical problems... Able to ask pertinent information questions.

Reading

Able to understand the main ideas of selected authentic material, (simple comic strips, adds, travel timetable, menus, periodical/web materials (in order to further develop reading skills as well as a more in depth comprehension about the topics. The student will be able to grasp the meaning of simple prose/verse, through various reading strategies such as skimming, identifying main ideas, using the dictionary...

Writing

Begin to create structured written material (in paragraphs) to describe and narrate past events grounded in personal experience, and express opinions, hopes and desires for the immediate future. Able to apply useful writing strategies such as the pastiche, organizing ideas in chronological order, avoiding redundancy.

Culture

Increase knowledge of significant differences between the varied and rich Hispanic culture and the learner's native culture, in behavior, attitudes and other aspects. Develop an awareness of language as an essential element of culture.

At the end of chapters VI, VII, VIII and IX, a quiz will be completed Via D2L Quiz. It will involve, reading, writing, listening, vocabulary and grammar.

- **2 Composiciones (D2L quizzes)**: These 2 compositions offer a chance to write what has been taught in each chapter. More instructions will be provided for each project in "D2L Exams."
- **3 Actividades culturales (D2L quizzes)**: These activities involve responding to questions based on the cultural readings of each chapter. To be completed Via D2L Quiz.
- **1 Presentación oral.** (The professor will assign the date to each student). Imagine you are teaching vocabulary, some structures (verbs in the past tense) and culture to a class in Calgary. This can be an individual presentation or you can work with another student. The following are the possible topics. Most of the conversation should be in the past:
 - Talk about travel and describe people, objects, places and situations in the past, add feelings and emotions.
 - Talk about past shopping experiences, clothes, colors, prices, add feelings and emotions.
 - Talk about eating habits, order food in a restaurant and devise a menu, describe a dish.

Required: before the presentation, please send me a summary or highlights of vocabulary, verbs in the past tense and the main ideas you want to present.

Attendance, active participation and homework: Participating fully in the Zoom sessions and completing all activities for any asynchronous sessions is expected. Class sessions are the primary venue for practicing and speaking Spanish, and speaking is one of the skills that this course develops. As such, regular attendance and participation are key to success in this course. Participation includes joining the Zoom session, following instructions given, speaking up during discussions and during activities in breakout rooms, and volunteering to ask and answer questions.

Homework assignments must be completed by the deadline and could involve but are not limited to D2L quizzes (for practice), audio/video recordings, listening practice, vocabulary practice, and grammar practice.

Lab. Your Lab. will meet once per week starting on Friday, September 17.

Students are expected to attend their assigned lab., follow the instructions of their instructor and complete all activities. These are designed to further skills developed in Spanish and review and practice the material covered in the course.
