DESCRIPTION

A continuation of Spanish 201, this is a beginning level course primarily for students with prior knowledge of the language (one semester of university level Spanish or Spanish 30). This course is structured on the communicative approach to language learning and strong emphasis is placed on basic skills, namely: listening, speaking, reading, writing and cultural awareness.

OBJECTIVES

This course, measured as an integrated performance in speaking, listening, reading and writing, is intended to familiarize you with the structure of the Spanish language, and expose you to different Hispanic cultures, increasing your awareness of the Spanish-speaking world.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of four skills:

Listening

You will be able to more completely understand the content of audio and video materials that accompany the textbook. You will also be able to recognize and understand expressions from authentic media.

Speaking

You will develop communicative abilities to express yourself in simple, real-life situations, such as making travel arrangements, describing situations in the past, expressing feelings and emotions, talking about fashion and food. You will also be able to ask pertinent questions and develop oral presentations.

Reading

You will be able to understand the main ideas of selected authentic material, (graphs, periodical/web materials) in order to further develop reading skills as well as a more in depth comprehension about the topics. You will also be able to grasp the meaning of simple texts, through various reading strategies such as skimming, scanning, and identifying main ideas.

Writing

You will be able to create structured written material (paragraphs) to describe and narrate past events grounded in personal experience as well as other topics covered during the course, such as those related to fashion and food.

COURSE NOTES

1. Important dates:

First class session: Monday, June 26.Last class session: Friday, August 4.

No class: Monday, July 3 (statutory holiday).

- 2. **Attendance**: attendance is essential. Attending both the lectures and the lab sessions is extremely beneficial to understanding the textbook content, to language development, to interacting with others, and to receiving feedback from your instructor and your peers. The instructor should be informed of any reason for prolonged absence. Please, notice that attendance will be considered for grading purposes (see below).
- 3. **Classroom etiquette**: Learning a language entails taking risks and allowing yourself to be vulnerable in front of other people. You are used to being able to speak at a much more sophisticated level in your native language, so communicating in Spanish is not always easy. Therefore, it is essential to establish an atmosphere of mutual respect in the classroom. Please be attentive and listen not only to your instructor but also to your classmates when they speak.
- 4. **Absences and requests for extensions**: Absences from in-class assessment, from courses with graded attendance, and requests for extensions on submitted work are usually reasonable grounds for instructors to ask for supporting documentation. https://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/m-1.html. Students are encouraged to have proactive discussions with the instructor in case prolonged absences occur or extensions are needed.
- 5. **Responsible use of D2L**: Important information and communication about this course will be posted on D2L (Desire2Learn), UCalgary's online learning management system. - **7. Participation:** Attendance and active participation are graded components of the course. Participation involves: preparation for class, frequency of participation, participation in the proposed activities during the class, and use of the target language. With the objective of fostering all four linguistic skills, students will be asked to complete writing as well as speaking assignments in class. Active participation presupposes engagements with such assignments, which counts toward your participation grade (see below).

The information on the course outline and posted on D2L is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.

All assessment components are cumulative. No final exam.

Online exams

There will be two timed online exams administered via D2L. The exams will be written during class time. The exams are expected to take 60 minutes, and students will have up to 90 minutes to them. The exams will include multiple-choice and essay questions. The use of translators and AI text generators to answer the questions is prohibited. If compelling evidence that you used such tools is found, you will receive a grade of zero on the exam. Students will have only one attempt to complete the online exams.

- Exam 1: Wednesday, July 12. Chapters 6 and 7.
- Exam 2: Wednesday, August 2. Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

Writing projects

Students will complete two short writing projects (to be submitted via Dropbox) on topics related to themes covered in the textbook. The writing projects will be written during class time. Topics and detailed assessment criteria for the written assignments will be provided closer to the due dates. The use of translators and AI text generators is highly discouraged. If you decide to use such tools, you are requested to include the following statement in your submitted work, adapting it as necessary: "I have used _____ [name of translator, AI text generator] in this assignment to _____ [write sentences, proofread my text, improve my text]. If you fail to disclose the use of such tools and compelling evidence that you used them is found, you will receive a grade of zero on the assignment.

Oral test

There will be one oral test in the form of a recorded oral presentation (video). Students are be expected to record and submit a video following the instructions provided by the instructor. The use of visual aid is



encouraged.

Online guizzes

Following each unit (from 6 to 9), students will be expected to complete an online quiz. There is no time limit to complete such quizzes, except that the quiz must be submitted by the deadline. Students may complete each quiz several times. As with the other assignments outlined in this course outline, the dates provided at this time are **tentative** and depend on when the units will be completed. Grading policy: best grade obtained.

Quiz 4: Monday: July 24.

Lecture/lab attendance and active participation

Attendance will be taken at every lecture and every lab session. Note that attendance is a **graded** assessment component of the course, and so is active participation. Active participation will be assessed based on the student's engagement with the proposed tasks and activities. Students who prefer not to speak in front of the class will not be penalized, but active and engaged participation in group activities is required.
