DESCRIPTION

This course analyzes different Nineteenth-Century narratives focusing in two key periods: the Independence and the "Foundational Fictions". We will work with literary texts and other cultural artifacts such as hymns, letters, recipes, etc. that will be analyzed as they also contribute to the organization of the national imaginary.

The Other –or Otherness- such as a woman, slave, outlaw, marginal subject, etc. will be the center of the analysis. National policies related to them as well as the debate between Conservatives and Liberals, which will take different forms in each of the countries, will be examined. Although we live in the XXI Century, we can find several nowadays policies rooted in the ideas of the XIX Century, so we might explore recent Cultural Phenomena.

The first portion of the course is focused on the narratives of the Independence and the "Criollo" discourse of this time. Literary texts had a crucial participation in the emergence of the new nationstates and the development of nationalism in Latin America so we will try to recover the meaning beneath them. The second portion of the course is focused in the long romances that were considered part of the upper-class family libraries during the second part of the century.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING:

1. Exams.- Three partial exams. They will cover all the materials seen in class up to that moment. Around 30-40 minutes.

2. Reaction Papers: Short essays to questions posted in Blackboard after analyzing the works in class. You will choose one topic –between two or three different choices- to write about. Around 1-2 pages (Times New Roman, 12)

3. Presentation.- You will do a short presentation about a country focusing on history, politics of race, gender inequality, wars, dictatorships, analysis of national symbols (anthems and flags of the new nations), new forms of kinship and affiliation (lodges, book clubs). Power Point presentation and handouts are a requirement for this assignment. You will sign in for a presentation during the second week of class (Set.20). Around 10 minutes.

4. Class Participation.- Daily course work will include activities that ask you to discuss topics related to a specific text, author or topic. In order to participate, you need to be in class; absences will affect the participation grade.

5. Research Project.- Your personal research project. It has to be a topic that is really compelling to you. You will have a meeting with the Professor to discuss the kind of project you are planning around half of the semester. You will bring the outline of your project (week 9). Information about this will be explained in class. You will bring a power point presentation and handouts for the rest of the class the day of the presentation (week 12). Your final paper should be turn-in during the last week of class. Around 5-8 pages. (Times New Roman, 12)

COURSE NOTES

1. The information on the course outline handed with this Course Information Sheet or posted on Blackboard is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.

Plagiarism is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one

submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2.
