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DESCRIPTION

We will explore the various meanings of 'Transnational' to determine if transnationalist approaches are useful or beneficial for the study of Latin- American cinemas. The analysis of representative films from the 1990s-2000s will provide a springboard into current debates about the place of these cinemas in the national and international film scenes. Departing from restrictive literary and content-based studies of cinema, this course will pay attention to cultural, industrial, and aesthetic flows and exchanges to situate Latin-American cinemas in a globalized economic and political order. All films are subtitled. This course relies on the reading and examination of academic texts, both in English and Spanish.

OBJECTIVES

Estudiar conceptos teóricos tales como transnacional, nacional, global, neoliberalismo, representación, ideología y cultura en su aplicación al análisis cinematográfico.

Aprender los términos técnicos esenciales para el análisis de los filmes.

Ganar una apreciación del cine como industria cultural y objeto artístico conectado con las estructuras sociales tanto a nivel nacional como global.

Explorar la posición del cine de Latinoamérica en la industria global.

Formarse en el análisis de de los filmes y de secuencia desde la óptica de los Estudios de cine.

OUTCOMES

Al final del curso podrás describir, analizar y evaluar la conexión entre conceptos teóricos y el contenido y la estructura formal de importantes filmes de Latinoamérica. También podrás entender los contextos nacionales, regionales y los llamados transnacionales en la cambiante discusión sobre la industria cinematográfica de Latinoamérica. Asímismo, obtendrás las herramientas para estudiar correctamente los filmes y escribir ensayos académicos.

COURSE NOTES

The information on the course schedule posted on D2L is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.

Los dos ensayos (1500 palabras cada uno) consistirán en el análisis fílmico. El trabajo final será un trabajo de investigación sobre un filme y se escribirá conforme a las normas vigentes bibliográficas. Ya que se requiere investigación para el trabajo final, el/la estudiante consultará fuentes secundarias de índole académica (un mínimo de 6), las citará correctamente y evaluará su contenido a la vez que formulará su propia lectura de la obra literaria en cuestión. En todos



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casos, los estudiantes recibirán dos notas de peso igual: una que corresponderá al análisis, la argumentación y el pensamiento, y otra que corresponderá a la exactitud gramática y el uso adecuado del vocabulario.

Exámenes parciales: abarcarán los contenidos vistos hasta el momento del parcial. Cada examen consistirá en responder a tres preguntas de desarrollo relacionadas con los autores y las obras estudiadas en clase y evaluará:

- Dominio y aplicación de los contenidos (30 puntos)
- Ideas personales razonadas a partir de los contenidos (30 puntos)
- Estructura y coherencia de la exposición (20 puntos)
- Empleo del lenguaje específico (vocabulario) (10 punto)
- Ortografía y redacción (10 puntos)

Los mensajes electrónicos serán respondidos entre 24 y 48 horas.

It is best if you ask **questions** about **any assignment** during office hours or by appointment as that will give me a better chance to address more clearly any issue or question you may have.

Use **e-mail** responsibly. I only check my e-mail during regular working-day hours. I do not answer e-mails about homework as all dates and requirements are specified in the syllabus.

Films are to be watched during the labs/tutorials. While viewing, you are expected to take written **notes** and get ready to ask/answer questions about the content and techniques used. Some films may contain strong language and sex scenes.

La participación es imprescindible en este curso, puesto que el debate y el trabajo en grupos pequeños forman parte importante de la metodología pedagógica del curso. Las/os estudiantes deberán participar en la construcción del conocimiento que busca impartir el curso. Por un lado, deberán participar activamente en los debates y análisis planteados en clase sobre los textos; por otro, deberán leer las lecturas asignadas en el programa y realizar los ejercicios de comprensión colgados en D2L. Readings for this course may be in English. You are expected to take notes, read all texts at home before each class, underline important information and get ready to answer/ask in class questions about the content and topics or concepts used. You must use your dictionaries to understand the readings and be able to express ideas in Spanish.

Será necesario completar todos los trabajos del curso para aprobarlo. Las fechas de todas las actividades aparecen en el calendario del curso, en D2L. Allí mismo encontrarán otros recursos que deberán ser preparados y estudiados semanalmente para la discusión en clase. Como complemento pedagógico de la asignatura, se emplearán materiales audiovisuales, fotografías, bibliografía y páginas Web ofrecidos por la profesora. Twice-weekly lectures will explore the topics for the week and will amplify and extend the issues raised in the reading material. Lectures will always include analysis and discussion of film clips and film stills. They are a key component of the course. Lecture notes and film clips *will not be posted online or given out to students*. Be sure to attend all lectures!

The final paper, as well as the two essays, must study a film classified as Latin-American (if you do not know the origin of a film, go to <u>www.imdb.com</u> or ask the professor). 10% of the grade will be deducted for each day any written assignment is late if there is no appropriate documentation to justify the absence or the failure to complete it. After 5 days, assignments will not be accepted.

- Electronic submission of assignments:

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
