DESCRIPTION

La lingüística aplicada es una rama de la lingüística cuya meta es la aplicación de las teorías, métodos y conocimientos propios de la lingüística a la resolución de problemas diversos en los que está implicado el uso de la lengua; en otros términos, se interesa por las aplicaciones de la lingüística en otras áreas de la experiencia humana. Debido a que las esferas que entrañan el uso de la lengua son múltiples y muy variadas, la lingüística aplicada comprende de hecho disciplinas diversas, la mayoría de las cuales se constituyen como campos interdisciplinares del saber.

Este curso trata de ofrecer un panorama lo más amplio posible de los principales aspectos tanto teóricos como prácticos de la lingüística aplicada a la lengua española. El curso estará dividido en varios módulos temáticos que analizarán tanto los objetivos como la metodología lingüística, la estructura fónica, morfológica y sintáctica del español y en particular sus aplicaciones en el ámbito de la enseñanza del español como lengua extranjera de manera descriptiva. Se hará un especial énfasis transversal sobre todas las cuestiones de tipo sociolingüístico relacionadas con el español normativo y sus diferentes usos y registros en el mundo hispánico.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or

laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
